December 3: What Are You Waiting For? On this first Sunday in Advent, we will explore the meaning of Advent from a Unitarian Universalist perspective. Through the imagery of darkness and light, and of waiting in patience, faith, hope, love, and joy, we will make an Advent wreath of Social Justice. The history of the evolution of Advent and mythology of birthing help us reconcile a Christian perspective with UU beliefs. Through the poetry of Wendell Berry we are made aware of the urgency to hold on to hope and light.

Following the service, the congregation is invited to make their own advent wreath and to construct their own Advent ritual.

December 10: An Explosive Legacy: Reflections on Nobel Day Alfred Nobel's family fortune came from new innovations with arms manufacturing and explosives. When his brother died, a French newspaper published Alfred's obituary by mistake, and in their obituary they noted that he was responsible for finding ways of killing people faster than ever before. Distressed, Alfred changed his will to create and fund the Nobel Prize, which continues to this day, and is still presented on December 10, the anniversary of Alfred Nobel's death. Message from the President, Doris Bergen



Hopedale's activities have proceeded well during the past month, although I was not there to be involved in them all the time. My daughter and I spent ten days in Europe on a river cruise. I found it very interesting to see many places I had read about but not ever seen, such as the Berlin Wall (what is left of it), Prague's medieval town buildings, Wittenberg's statue of Martin Luther, and many other historic sites. That experience has reminded me of Jerome Bruner's discussion of the importance of "enactive representation," which asserts that intellectual growth has its primary basis in our physical experiencing of the world. (This is sometimes called "embodied cognition".) While we get much information from pictures, reading, the internet, and other sources, nothing can quite compare with "real world" experiences. Thus, our UU strong advocacy for involvement in active social justice causes benefits not only those we help but also ourselves because we gain deeper understanding of social

of our Hopedale property (or being in our yoga class!). There are always projects in the Oxford and broader Butler County community needing our participation and it is useful to remember that this participation benefits not only the agency or group needing help but also it enables us to have greater understanding of the issues and needs of our communities. That is, we learn deeply not only from reading, discussing, and hearing talks about issues and theories but also by our active physical engagement in the world! My wish for us all during the coming holiday season is to have our real-world actions enable us both to better understand and to positively affect the world!

At our last board meeting, we approved the establishment of the HUUC History Committee, with members Valerie Elliott, Curt Ellison, Genevieve O'Malley-Knight, and Susan Thrasher. These people have been working informally for a while sorting and storing historical records and library materials and deciding on archival practices and we realized that this is an ongoing task that should be supervised by this type of committee. If you have a box of Hopedale information (newsletters, photographs, newspaper items, bulletins, or other potential archival materials), please let the committee members know and they will "take it off your hands" and decide what to archive and what to discard. The board is very appreciative of the initiative being taken by this group and are pleased to have a formal method of taking care of Hopedale historical information.

Our choir is busy preparing music for the regular and special services and thanks go especially to our choir director, Patty Klingenberg, as well as to our pianist, Wayne Copenhaver, for the extra time and effort that is needed at this time of year. We appreciate all our choir members, too, since practicing takes their time as well. While I am in the thanking mode, let me also thank the members of the Religious Services Committee who plan and lead our Sunday Services. This committee is chaired by Linda Amspaugh. In a congregation without a minister, this is an especially important task, and the consistently interesting and meaningful services they plan and provide are much appreciated by the Hopedale congregation.

[Just Mercy book discussion group](#): Inspired by last spring's guest speaker, Jacov Delaney from the Ohio Policy and Justice Center, as well as by the author's Ware Lecture at GA this summer, Hopedale will be holding a book group to discuss *Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption* by Bryan Stevenson. This book was a UUA Common Read two years ago. Description from the UUA website:

Stevenson, founder of the Equal Justice Initiative, has dedicated his legal career to defending those who are trapped by an often capricious, political, and willfully unjust criminal justice system - poor people, people of color, children, and others over whom the system has run roughshod. It speaks to justice, mercy, and compassion, themes of concern to us as Unitarian Universalists and as human beings. It follows on recent Common Reads, such as *The New Jim Crow* and *Reclaiming Prophetic Witness*, and responds to recent statements passed by the delegates to the UUA General Assembly.

We will hold three or four meetings in late January and early February. To give input on scheduling, please see an R.E. Committee member sometime in December. We are considering holding this book group at Oxford's Lane Public Library. The library can make copies of the book available for group members to check out and this location might make it easier for members of the larger community to join with Hopedale in this important discussion.

Oxford Habitat for Humanity - Faith Build

Economic Social Justice

Hopedale is putting together crews of workers to participate in the 2017 Faith Build, a Habitat for Humanity project. Oxford area churches are joining together with Miami Students and other community organizations to fund and build the 9th and 10th Habitat houses in the development of Reckford Woods, Carter Circle, near US 27, west of Oxford. The home buyer family contributes over 500 hours of "sweat equity" in the building of the house.

Oxford Presbyterian Church, Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, St. Mary Catholic Church, Oxford United Methodist Church, Hopedale UUs, and Faith Lutheran Church have banded together for this venture.

Our bit: On each of our three scheduled workdays, 5 Hopedale friends and members will work on the house site with 10 Miami U. students, and 5 Habitat workers. We will also provide a lunch for the 20 worker/volunteers on those days. You don't have to be a skilled house builder to participate! No experience is necessary and all supervision, tools and equipment are provided. The Habitat workers provide the expertise and the MU students provide the oomph.

People, 16 and older, can work on the house and those who are younger can help with making and serving lunch. You can contribute in so many ways, work on the house, prepare lunch for the volunteers, make individual contributions and support fundraisers to raise the funds for Habitat.

Making Social Justice Local

Natural disasters and social crises in our country and around the world can feel overwhelming. Our community responded generously both with compassion and with material support to the events over the past several months. In December we narrow our focus and consider social justice more locally.

The Oxford community and Miami University along with Oxford Citizens for Peace and Justice are exploring the "Not In Our Town" movement which inspires and empowers communities to **stop hate, address bullying, and build safe, inclusive communities for all**. **The Social Justice Committee will be exploring ways to participate.**

As part of our Welcoming Congregation initiative, we **bring home the national need for promoting racial justice and supporting the LGTQIA** community by offering a **workshop with Danielle West on Sunday November 26 12 – 1:30** following the service at Hopedale. Our facilitator, **danielle marilyn west** [*intentional use of lower case*], is a cultural worker, educator and community organizer. A Midwestern mixed-class queer white woman of trans experience, danni has been organizing for more than 15 years, primarily focusing on two strategies: one is building with white folks to expand antiracist solidarity and the second is to build with queer, trans and gender non-conforming folks, primarily in multiracial organization, against the prison industrial complex. danni was active with TGIJP, the Transgender Gender Variant Intersex Justice Project, since she moved to

Convocation at Earlham College with Reverend William J. Barber

Several members of Hopedale traveled to Earlham November 1 to listen to Reverend Barber. For those who heard him at the UUA Assembly in Columbus last summer, you know with what a powerful voice he speaks. His call is to continue the work of Dr. Martin Luther King's Poor People's Campaign through ***the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival***. The Campaign will build a broad and deep national moral fusion movement — rooted in the leadership of the poor and dispossessed as moral agents and reflecting the great moral teachings — to unite our country from the bottom up. In other words Barber explains, to unravel the Southern Strategy that made poor whites, who should have been allies with poor blacks, think that their problem, their poverty was being caused because black and brown people who were acquiring something or taking something from them.

Our neighboring state of Indiana is one of the states the campaign will be focusing on. The campaign is a serious social justice action begun in the spring of 2017 and culminating next June. *“By engaging in highly publicized civil disobedience and direct action over a 6-week period in at least 25 states and the District of Columbia during the Spring of 2018, the Campaign will force a serious national examination of the enmeshed evils of systemic racism, poverty, militarism and environmental devastation during a key election year while strengthening and connecting informed and committed grassroots leadership in every state, increasing their power to continue this fight long after June 2018.”*
