October 8: Caring for the Land so the Land Will Care for Us:

What You Should Know about the Three Valley Conservation Trust This illustrated presentation will briefly discuss some of the origins of a land conservation ethic in the United States, especially in the Midwest and Cincinnati area, and how a group of concerned Miami professors in the early 1990s banded together to establish the area's first land trust. Re-named in 2001, the Three Valley Conservation Trust's Mission today is to conserve natural habitats, waterways and agricultural lands in Southwestern Ohio, for the benefit of present and future generations, through partnerships with people and communities. The Core Values, Goals and Vision of the Trust will be briefly highlighted, along with selected examples of key projects and conservation easements. The importance of the Trust's Mission to the overall quality of all biotic life and our need to be supporters of the Trust's Mission will conclude the presentation.

October 15: As Time Goes By: A Unitarian Take on the Gregorian Calendar On October 15, 1582, Pope Gregory XIII implemented the Gregorian Calendar. October 4 of that year was followed directly by October 15 to implement the new calendar system. The Gregorian Calendar has become the most widely used civil calendar system in the world. 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communities-- held UU White Supremacy Teach-ins. Through public witness, education, and introspection, our faith is coming to understand that fighting white supremacy means both resisting its most blatant forms "out there," and disrupting its systemic manifestations within.

The Teach-In team again calls our siblings in faith to action to continue the work of growth and learning. On Sunday, October 22nd, we will join together with UU communities nationwide in Part Two of the UU White Supremacy Teach-in. Our power and reach are magnified when we come together.

Combating overt white supremacy and white supremacy culture is a theological endeavor for our faith-- from the top of the UUA, to each individual in every congregation and community. Social Justice Committee The Social Justice Committee members look forward to a lively engaged year of putting social justice into action. We have identified projects to support and promote the UUA Study Action Issues of Corruption of Our Democracy and Escalating Inequality as well as building on this community's commitment to the environment and being a welcoming community.

1. How to Be an Ally to People of Color In order to achieve this, we need to acknowledge our position of white privilege. This includes understanding white supremacy, the racist history of America, and our own racial identity. It includes working for change and building positive anti-racist white identities. In the coming weeks we will offer ways to engage in this work using the UUA's Examining Whiteness curriculum.

We are working to build connections to Miami University and to the student Black Lives Matter group and to Oxford and the "Not in Our Town" initiative.

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Columbus! Social Justice is in the planning stages to attend, hopefully with the BLM students at Miami. More to come, but clear your calendar...it's at an awkward time of day.

We are trying to coordinate with black student groups at Miami and in the community to charter a 56 passenger bus to Earlham.

Please be alert for more information and check your schedules! Suggested reading: *The Third Reconstruction: How a Moral Movement is Overcoming the Politics of Division and Fear*.

2. Being a Green Sanctuary and follow-up From the Ashes documentary film on coal. How can Hopedale be a part of transitioning to clean, renewable energy? Can our green sanctuary be a role model for the greater community? Last summer we visited the Friends Meeting in Clifton to see their conversion to solar roof panels. Solar technology is now feasible as well as efficient low tower wind turbines. SJ plans to begin a feasibility study of solar/wind power options possible for Hopedale. Persons with interest and expertise are encouraged to contact the SJ committee.

3. Supporting racial justice as it intersects with environmental justice. We will continue to follow and support the native people of Standing Rock. We will maintain our connection to the Water Walkers and Native American students at Miami University.

Habitat for Humanity Faith Build in Oxford

Oxford area churches are joining together with Miami Students and other community organizations to fund and build the 9th and 10th Habitat houses in the development of Reckford Woods. These last two houses provide an opportunity for the faith community to serve alongside and partner with a Habitat Home Buyer Family. Each family must contribute over 500 hours of "sweat equity" in the building of the house. The foundation ia going to be poured and work on the structure will begin in November 4 and continue throughout the fall and winter finishing up in the spring.

In addition to Hopedale, the Oxford Presbyterian Church, Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, St. Mary Catholic Church, Oxford United Methodist Church, and Faith Lutheran Church have all banded together for this venture. Each church will provide build teams of volunteers for Saturday through Thursday workdays. A typical build schedule is approximately 16-20 weeks with volunteers working each Saturday. No experience is necessary and all supervision, tools and equipment are provided. The churches participating in the Faith Build will share the cost of the home with other donor sources.

You can contribute in so many ways, work on the house, prepare lunch for the volunteers, make individual contributions and support fundraisers to raise the funds for Habitat. Our
