Plans are, as mystery lovers might sometimes say, afoot for the beginning of our new church year. The In-person Task Force will review results of a recent congregational survey concerning best ways for us to return face-to-face as the pandemic risk, hopefully, declines for vaccinated persons. Not everyone can be vaccinated, though, so we're very glad that Neil Danielson secured a grant to assist in purchasing key equipment needed for future multi-platform gatherings. Thanks to Neil!

We can expect to continue Zoom Sunday services through August. However, in-person gatherings are already happening as Social Justice and Religious Education combined to offer an outdoor gathering July 25, volunteer gardeners continue their outdoor work, and the Board plans to begin meeting in a multi-platform format starting August 9. We are watching public health notices and news of pandemic trends in our area, keeping Zoom options alive, and beginning to anticipate again seeing our community in person.

Peter and Kathleen Carels have generously donated a solar array for installation at Hopedale. This should significantly reduce our annual energy costs while extending our green sanctuary commitments. We already subscribe to a green energy provider whose sources are wind generators, and we are seriously grateful to Peter and Kathleen for now making possible solar energy at Hopedale!

During the summer our Nominating Committee of Linda Amspaugh and Liz Woedl helped secure new committee chairs for Hopedale. Beginning July1, Jennifer Blue heads the Sunday Service Committee and Liz Woedl heads both the Finance Committee and Social Justice Committee. In early September we will release an updated list of Hopedale committees, representatives and appointees for 2021-2022. If you are not already involved and are interested in serving on a committee, let us know.

Interviews with potential architects are ongoing and we hope to soon name a firm to assist us for the next stages of Hopedale's facilities improvement project, which involve creating drawings of a possible addition and better estimates of costs for what we want to do. It's safe to say that refinancing alone will not fund all of the congregation's priorities, so if you have not yet become involved in this effort by contributing to the Facilities Fund, please consider helping Hopedale with this project. Updates from Hopedale Task Forces

HUUC In-Person Gathering Task Force led by Neil Danielson

The proposal to allow Zoom production of Sunday services held at Hopedale has been funded by the Munroe Husbands Grant Program of the Midwest UUA. About \$1,000 of the \$,1600 budget is for a dedicated laptop computer for Zoom and the remainder is for a high quality web cam, music-quality microphone, and various stands. Before any purchases are made, input from more knowledgeable people as well as Task Force members about this Zoom production plan will be obtained. Final approval of purchases will be made via a recommendation of the Task Force to the Board.

A survey about the transition to in-person services in the fall, drafted by Neil Danielson, expanded by Curt Ellison, and converted to e-mail surveys by Celia Ellison, was sent out by Celia. Response has been good, with 32 responses to the Sunday Services survey and 26 responses to the Gatherings/RE survey. Data are being summarized and will be discussed by the Task Force at an upcoming meeting. At this time we expect services to remain primarily via Zoom in August. Written guidelines about whether and how services should be conducted, hopefully starting in September, are forthcoming from the Task Force.

Hopedale Construction Task Force led by Robert Bell

The Construction Task Force has met a few times to discuss our objectives and to interview potential architectural firms that could work with us on renovations to the Hopedale building. The Task Force sent detailed materials to two architects and met with each via Zoom to discuss their approaches to our project. Each expressed concern with our budget, based on what we want to achieve. No final decisions have been made, discussions are continuing, and we may include a contractor in discussions of scope and potential costs. Once the Task Force has successfully recommended hiring an architect and a contractor, those firms will be announced and next planning stages will follow.

Environmental Corner

The 2022-2023 Ohio Budget

In the last-minute flurry to finalize the state budget before the June 30th deadline, the Ohio General Assembly also passed two energy bills that have subsequently been signed by Governor DeWine.

The first was House Bill 201, which forbids local government entities from preventing access, zoning or taxing natural gas hook-ups in new buildings. Stopping new natural gas hook-ups has been implemented in some states as a way to help meet future carbon emission reduction targets. New natural gas hook-ups lock buildings into carbon emissions for years. This is one of the many ways Ohio Legislators have been trying to slow the switch to renewable energy recently. One of the arguments here is that developers need standard regulations across the state -- no local piece-meal regs!

The second bill signed was HB 52, which allows county commissioners veto power over proposed wind and solar energy projects in their counties. It's the opposite philosophy of the previous bill! At first proponents targeted only wind projects, using the rationale that wind farms have widespread effects on local areas such as property values. Solar was then added, although solar has almost no effect on neighbors. The county veto must now come early in the planning process – a big improvement from the original bill, which would allow it at the end of the approval process. The bill also adds two local voting members to the Ohio Power Siting Board for projects in their area. The argument here is that locals need more say in projects that affect them! HB 52 would go into effect in 90 days and would not apply to the 23 solar projects and one wind project* currently under review. Of course, it also does not apply to any new fossil fuel energy projects such as fracking or gas-fired generating plants.

Other budget items with social justice implications include language allowing medical professionals to refuse treatments that violate their ethical beliefs. Critics fear that this opens the door to discrimination against LBGTQ individuals. Increased Medicaid for certain groups – new mothers, children with medical handicaps –- was also added. The legislators also passed revisions to the school funding formula that was declared unconstitutional many years ago. The new plan has been supported by most school groups, in spite of increasing vouchers and charter-school funding. The six-year plan has been approved for only the first two years.

And there's the 3% across-the-board income tax cut! The income floor below which no income tax is due was raised which will help low-income families. At the same time the top tax bracket was eliminated – there are now only four brackets -- and the rate for the top bracket was reduced, especially benefitting those with incomes over \$110K.

• If you are wondering why there's only one new wind energy project seeking approval, it's because of the clause in the 2014 budget bill that TRIPLED the wind set-back requirements. This was added at the last minute without public debate, and is still in effect. It essentially killed wind investment in Ohio even though NW Ohio has some of the best wind resources in the mid-west! Indiana has nearly triple the installed wind power as Ohio now.

The Legislature is now on summer break. But stayed tuned!! One of the parts of the budget bill that Dewine vetoed allowed Senate and House leaders to file lawsuits challenging new redistricting maps.

This was a guided trip of five "tourists" and eighteen very experienced support Africans who carried the major supplies, food, and water. They started at about 6,000 feet but hiked fairly slowly to get used to the altitude, particularly when reaching 15,000 feet. For the last 4,000 feet or so, it was a very slow midnight climb at sub-zero temperatures with flashlights/head lamps, reaching the summit at sunrise for beautiful views (the pictures were amazing)!

Kami and Neil are so glad the climbers had altitude sickness medicine and they all had a safe trip. Ryan is still in Tanzania until early August, volunteering at an orphanage with Ben, while Cassidy is a travel nurse.
